What is Ability Links?

Ability Links helps people with disability, their families and carers make a difference.

We will also help to promote the rights of people with disability to live full lives and to be part of their local community.

Ability Links wants to help people take part in the activities offered by all services and organisations, by :

- Listening to what you want and recognising the skills and abilities of people with disability, their families and carers; and
- Building links within communities so that people make it easier for those with disability to be involved in what's happening in the local community.

What are my Rights?

As a participant of Ability Links you have the right to:



What are my Responsibilities?

As a participant of Ability Links you have the responsibility to:

- Be in Charge
- To tell us if you change your mind
- Treat staff with dignity and respect
- Let us know if we can't meet for any reason



What about my Privacy?

Your contact with Ability Links will be confidential.

This means that anything you tell us will not be shared with anyone unless you give your permission.

We will keep your file locked away when it is not in use.



Ability Links Responsibilities as a Mandatory Reporter

Ability Links is a mandatory notification agency.

This means we must notify the authorities if we believe a child is in danger of significant harm or abuse.

Significant harm or abuse can be:

- yelling
- neglect
- sexual abuse



If we are concerned about a child's safety we will make the report, and we will tell you about it.
