Pathfinders

Pathfinders is a large community-based organisation providing Supported Accommodation and Homelessness services, Family and Youth Support services, National Aboriginal Birth Certificate program, Client Support Services and Out of Home Care services. Pathfinders' services are located across the Mid North Coast, New England and North West Regions.

Pathfinders' vision is that all children, young people and their families will have a home and family where they feel they belong, are free from abuse, neglect, discrimination and inequality, and are able to achieve and contribute to their full potential.

The Sanctuary Model

Sanctuary is an organisational framework that ensures that our culture and practices are guided by Trauma-informed principles. Sanctuary goes beyond providing a set of tools and techniques – it is a culture shift to address the effects of trauma at every level. Pathfinders have made a commitment to embed the accredited and widely adopted Sanctuary model into every aspect of our organisation.

Role of the Therapeutic Specialist

The Therapeutic Specialist provides clinical leadership and consultation to the team. They also provide primary and secondary therapeutic support for children and young people in out- of-home care. This role includes managing the dynamic, transactional and systemic broader systems of support around the young person.

Selection Criteria

- Appropriate tertiary qualification(s) in Psychology, Social Work, Occupational Therapy, Mental Health or a related discipline.
- Post graduate training in relevant child, adolescent and family clinical practice, family therapy and systemic thinking is preferred.
- Experience in completing assessments for children and young people and using the findings to complete a comprehensive therapeutic written report or care plan designed to inform staff and child interactions and the Care Team's planning.
- A knowledge and understanding of Aboriginal culture and values and an awareness of the current issues faced by Aboriginal children, young people and their families.
- Practice knowledge relevant to working with traumatised and vulnerable children, young people and families such as child development and the impact of trauma; including the ability to provide therapeutic clinical assessment and trauma informed interventions.
- A well-developed understanding of Attachment and Trauma Theories, their relationship to child abuse and neglect, together with an understanding of social, emotional and cognitive disabilities and an ability to assist others to understand their associated implications.
- Experience in providing supervision, secondary consultation, training and advice to clinicians, other professionals, staff and carers
- Proven highly developed interpersonal skills, emotional intelligence and excellent engagement skills, especially in engaging children and young people who have experienced significant trauma, disrupted attachment and demonstrated extreme emotional and behavioural dysregulation.
- Ability to work collaboratively and the demonstrated capacity to negotiate and liaise with internal and external stakeholders including DCJ, other agencies and the community.
- Demonstrable analytical problem-solving skills, the ability to assess options and identify and implement creative, innovative and flexible solutions.
- Evidence of a holistic understanding of the complexity of the child protection and out-of-home care service system and the issues involved in providing services to statutory clients.
- Willingness to align personal values consistent with the values of Pathfinders, including a willingness to embrace the Sanctuary Model and principles.

- Willingness to sign and actively abide by Pathfinders Code of Conduct.
- Observe and actively support Pathfinders WH&S policy and strategy.
- Attend mandatory and other training as required.
- Participate in and promote continuous quality improvement processes.
- Promote an environment that is culturally safe, and strengths focused.
- Abide by principles and commitments of the Sanctuary Framework.
- Travel as required.

How to apply

Applicants MUST follow these steps to be considered for the position.

1. Prepare a typed application which includes:
 - A statement against each of the essential and desirable selection criteria for the position, giving examples to demonstrate how you meet them.
 - A current resume detailing your relevant skills and experience.
 - A photocopy of your relevant academic qualifications.
 - The names and phone numbers of two recent work-related Referees (at least one referee should be a recent supervisor, if possible).

Purpose of position

The Therapeutic Specialist provides clinical leadership and consultation to the team. They also provide primary and secondary therapeutic support for children and young people in out-of-home care. Reporting relationship and accountabilities

Therapeutic Specialist will:

- Be responsible to the Area Manager.
- Implement strategies and tasks set by the Area Manager to achieve the goals of Pathfinders.
- Participate in the day-to-day operations of the young peoples' programs (OOHC and Disabilities).
- Nurture the relationships between all Pathfinders teams.

Specific tasks and responsibilities

Therapeutic Specialist will:

- Provide therapeutic leadership and trauma informed interventions, based on sound practice expertise, contemporary research and program guidelines that deliver positive outcomes for vulnerable children, young people and their families.
- Ensure that appropriate assessment procedures, risk assessment, therapeutic planning processes and outcome measurements are undertaken for each child or young person in the programs as required.
- Facilitate the development of Behaviour Support Plans and Therapeutic Care Plans.
- Facilitate group work, especially in the areas of trauma and its impact on the child or young person.
- Facilitate regular reflective practice sessions for program staff.
- Collaborate with members of the care team to support children and young people to develop and maintain positive links within the local community.
- Work co-operatively with staff, the Department of Communities and Justice (DCJ), and other services; and consultation to provide strategies and plans to meet the mental health needs of Pathfinders Young people (particularly within OOHC and Disability programs).
- Report regularly through Supervision internally and external Clinical supervision process.
- Participate in organisation wide service provision, training, quality assurance mechanisms and service development.
- Assist in the development of quality assurance and quality improvement frameworks for trauma informed service delivery.
- Develop and maintain effective relationships with key internal and external stakeholders.
- Represent Pathfinders as required.
- Undertake other duties and responsibilities as required

Pathfinders across the New England, North West Tablelands and Mid North Coast

Pathfinders is now located in offices across the New England and North West Tablelands at Moree, Inverell, Glen Innes, Tamworth and Armidale and the Mid North Coast at Kempsey, Taree, Port Macquarie and Coffs Harbour.

Our services continue to grow with our organisation now supporting children, young people and their families with supported accommodation services, family and youth support services, juvenile justice, youth work, child protection, and Out of Home Care services.

Pathfinder's programs and services include:

- Youth social, recreational and vocational programs.
- Family referral services to ensure assistance gets to families and their children when they need it
- Information and referral assistance to link clients with appropriate support agencies
- Refuge and supported accommodation services to young people
- Full time support for young people in out-of-home care
- Juvenile justice supports services to assist young people to reintegrate into our communities
- Child protection and family referral services
- Field placement and training for local TAFE and University students seeking employment in human services
- Provision of out of home care services, foster care support programs and foster care programs for children and young people under the guardianship of the Minister for Community Services
- Provision of family preservation services, supervised contact, therapeutic camps/activities and after-care services to vulnerable children, young people and their families
